A Report on Second Institutional Capacity Building Workshop for OER-based E-Learning





Venue: Wawasan Open University, Penang, Malaysia

Background

In the context of institutional Capacity building on issues relating to OER, a workshop (first) was held at Wawasan Open University, Penang, Malaysia from Jan 29 to Feb 1, 2013 with a view to build capacity on the adoption and use of OER and e-learning amongst academics of Open University /ODL institutions of Commonwealth Asia and design and develop module for a course on OER. In this workshop along with the capacity building an attempt was made to develop a curriculum for an OER course and also to design and develop the draft modules on five themes relating to OER. In this workshop a total of twenty seven persons participated representing four countries. In the first workshop the participants acquired the knowledge and skills relating to Open Learning, Open Scholarship, designing Learning & Teaching for an OER-Based learning environment, identifying assessment tasks and activities, developing assessment criteria and feedback strategies and finally developing OER course design and the curriculum for an OER based course.

After the first workshop the groups developed the modules and the draft was finalised in another workshop held internally at WoU for the module coordinators. This workshop was held at WoU on 13-14 April, 2013.

In sequence to the development of five draft modules for a course on OER, the second capacity building workshop was held at WoU from 10-14 June,2013

Objectives

The objective of the capacity building workshop 2 were to:

- Reinforce the understanding of concepts and issues relating to OER among the participants
- Refine and finalise five modules which were outlined in the first workshop and developed during the period between the two workshops
- Refine activities and assessment strategies for the contents of the OER modules

The five day schedule (Annexure I) was developed and implemented to ensure achievement of the above objectives

Participants

Fourteen persons participated in the workshop. All the fourteen persons had attended the first workshop. The institution /country wise representation was Malaysia-11 (10 from WoU, one from OUM,), 2 from India (one each from IGNOU, NIOS) one from Open University of Sri Lanka. In addition four facilitators and one observer participated in the workshop (Annexure II)

Inaugural session

The workshop began with a welcome address by Prof. Mohan Menon, who briefed about the activities carried out so far as part of CEMCA-WoU collaborative Programme of Institutional Capacity Building Workshop for OER-based E-Learning and the activities which are yet to be completed. He also informed about the purpose of this second workshop and the outcomes likely to be achieved at the end of the workshop. Professor Dato' Dr. Ho Sinn Chye in his remarks expressed his happiness about the progress made and assured all support to achieve the set goals of the collaborative programme of CEMCA and WoU. Dr.Sanjaya Mishra expressed happiness about the progress and narrated the activities carried out in phased manner and things to be completed before the launch of OER course on an e-based platform.

Workshop/Training Inputs

As mentioned earlier the focus of this five day workshop was on capacity building and finalisation of the following 5 modules. With this on focus the training schedule was developed.

- Concept and Practices of OER and Their Significance
- Selecting and Evaluating OERs
- Designing Learning Experiences for OER-based e-Learning
- Copyright and licensing for OER
- Integrating OER in e-learning

The day one was exclusively used to understand the work done by each group in relation to the module development. Each group presented their work and the feedback was provided by the facilitators and other participants. The issues covered in the presentation included Learning outcomes, Scenarios used, OER materials referred/used with links, activities and assignments included .The suggestions provided with respect to each module is consolidated and given in **Annexure III**

Day 2 and 3 was spent on group work to revise modules based on the feedback provided during presentation. When the participants were working on their module the facilitators went round and provided support to each of the groups. On day three sometime was also spent to highlight the 9 principles of teaching-learning design so that the focus continue to be there on the principles while developing/finalising the module

On day 4, one more round of presentation was done by each group followed by discussions and suggestions by the facilitators and participants for further improvement of each of the modules. Keeping in view the suggestions provided, the groups again worked on the modules.

The presentation, review and discussion on each module was scheduled in such a way to cover the following aspects

- The design of the student learning experience based on our commitments and expectations, and principles and guidelines.
- Reusing, revising, remixing and redistributing
- Tagging, meta-tagging
- Finding, mapping, matching, evaluating OER
- Integrating OER in course development

On day 5 a discussion was held about the structure and sequencing of module contents. (**Annexure IV**) and also a brief discussion was held on the LMS development requirements for launching the programme (**Annexure V**).

Resources

The resources for this workshop included all the reference materials provided in the previous workshop and the draft modules developed by various groups.

Evaluation and feedback

A questionnaire was developed and used for getting the feedback of the participants (Annexure VI). The feedback was obtained from 14 participants during the last session of the workshop on 14th June, 2013.

- The training programme was well received.
- The participants were able to finalise all the five modules.

- On a four point scale two major questions were asked one relating to indicate the knowledge gained and another on skills enhanced. The rating was more than 3 (on 4 point scale) except for the item skill enhanced Refining learning outcomes (2.8) Knowledge enhancement with respect to :
 - a. Knowledge about OER (3.0)
 - b. Designing courses for OER (3.4)
 - c. Open Education Practice (3.3)
 - d. Implementing OE Practices (3.5)
 - e. Open Licensing (3.0)
 - f. Integrating OER in Course Designs (3.3)

Skill enhancement with respect to:

- a. Refining Learning outcomes (2.8)
- b. Designing Scenarios (3.2)
- c. Searching for OERs (3.3)
- d. Integrating OER in teaching and learning (3.3)
- e. Designing learning Activities (3.3)
- f. Aligning the activities with the learning outcomes (3.3)
- For the question on *what aspects of the workshop they liked most*, the response of participants were: Group discussion, working in groups, peer and facilitators feedback, designing scenario based learning, developing the OER module, applying scenario based learning
- For another question on any other information/ feedback, the response included: how to do references to OER..
- One suggestion from the participants was about the need for supply of module structure in the first workshop.
- For the question about willingness to work as tutor, 12 expressed their willingness to work as tutor, when the OER course is offered on line.
